

Glimpses of 2017-18

- 1. In the year 2016-17, a total of 147 students of our college got merit positions in the University Merit list out of which 11 students were placed at first position, 8 students got second position and 13 got third position.
- 2. The Annual Athletic Meet for the session 2017-18 was organised on 6th and 7th March 2018. Harjeet Kaur and Gaurav Chaudhary were declared best athletes among girls and boys respectively. Our student of BBA-1 Annual Jain brought laurels to the college by winning gold and silver medals in various national and International level shooting championships. Apart from shooting, our students won various medals at national and international level in the events of weightlifting, baseball, softball, taekwondo, boxing, judo and archery.
- 3. The college has three NSS units in wing-I,II,III respectively. These units are effectively creating awareness in the society about literacy, tree plantation, cleanliness, ecology & environment, digitalization, health awareness and conservation of natural resources. Our student Hemant Kumar was declared the best NSS volunteer of the University for this session. Our team 'BATI' from NSS wing-III won the hearts through their 'NUKKAD NATAK" performance at Surajkund International Craft Mela held in Feb. 2018.
- 4. Our NCC unit of boys won second position in the parade held on the occasion of Independence Day on 15th August 2017. Kapil, Amit, Suraaj and Love Mann made us proud by getting selected in Indian Security Services.
- 5. There are 3 separate units of Women Cell in our college. This year the Cell was actively involved in Anaemia Eradication Drive along with organising Workshops on Self Defence, Gender Sensitisation and Women Empowerment. Besides this, students visited Women Police Station Sector-16 Faridabad to understand the functioning of Police Station. They were also sent to Pt. JLN Govt. College and KL Mehta College, Faridabad for participation in various competitions.
- 6. From this session, Maharaja Agarsain Jayanti was started to be celebrated as 'Navrang' Cultural Fest. On 5-6 October 2017 this fest was organised with much fan-fare at Inter University level. 8 universities, 18 colleges and nearly 116 participants participated in the events of Symposium, Poetic Recitation, Tabla, Geet/Ghazal/Bhajan singing, Solo/Group Dance, Rangoli, Poster Making/Slogan-Writing and Quiz.
- 7. Every year our college organises educational trips and excursions to various destinations for the overall growth of the students of all the streams. This year students visited Nainital, World Book fair, Parliament House, Vrindavan and Agra.
- 8. YRC Merit Certificate was awarded to Dr. Jay Pal Singh, YRC Counsellor from Hon'ble Governer of Haryana for distinguished Youth Red Cross work for the year 2016-17 on January20, 2018. The Youth Red Cross of the college was also awarded Youth Red Cross Shield in the same function. YRC of the college organised two 5 day District level YRC training camps with District Red Cross Society Faridabad in the college from 19-02-2018 to 23-02-2018 and from 16-04-2018 to 20-04-2018. It also organised 5 day First Aid & Home Nursing Training Camp in the college and 7 day Professional First Aid Training Camp with District Red Cross Society Faridabad & St. John Ambulance Association, Faridabad. Our YRC volunteers participated in 11 various National / State/University/District level camps besides attending 05 workshops / activities organised by M.D.University Rohtak. 08 Awareness Workshops on Health issues & 06 Health Check up camps were also organised in the college by YRC. International Youth Day, World AIDS day,

- National Youth Day, World Cancer Day, World Water Day, World Health Day, World Red Cross Day & International Thalassemia Day were also celebrated. In two Mega Blood Donation Camps organised on 4-10-2017 and 26-02-2018, a total of 540 units of blood were collected.
- 9. In loving memory of Late Sh. Jai Bhagwan Sharma, a CISF Jawan and an alumnus of Aggarwal College Ballabgarh, who sacrificed his life in 1995 for the nation in a terrorist attack, a martyr memorial has been raised in the college portals in his honour. The unveiling of the memorial was done by Ms. Sureena Rajan, IAS, Director General, Bureau of Indian Standards, Mr. Devender Kumar Gupta, President College Governing Body, Principal Dr. Krishan Kant and Mr. Yashpal Singh Shekhawat, Dy. Commandant, CISF Unit IGSTPP Jharli, Haryana. The family of the martyr was also honoured.
- 10. Career Counselling and Placement Cell serves as a bridge between the college and various industries. Various Job fairs and placement drives were conducted during the whole session. 'Policy Bazar' conducted interviews in all three wings of the college and shortlisted nearly 65 students. Another Job Fair was conducted by District Employment Exchange Faridabad wherein 18 companies participated to recruit the students for different profiles.
- 11. 'Mini Bazaar', a Mega Retail Marketing event was organized on 27th Feb, 2018 by the students of B.Voc Retail Management. This event was organized to promote entrepreneural skills of the students and give them exposure to marketing strategies. More than 20 stalls were installed by the students of UG & PG courses. - 12. In collaboration with Haryana Vishwakarma Skill University, Gurugram, a 5 day course on Personality Development and Soft Skills for B.A., B.Com., B.Com. (CA), B.Com (Hons), B.Voc (RM), BBA, BBA (CAM), BCA has started from 16th May, 2018. This course is for a batch of 30 students of final year of each stream trained separately for a duration of 5 days each.
- 13. Every year various workshops, FDPs and Conferences are organised to enhance the knowledge & skill of both faculty and students. In this direction, the Economics department organised a "World Economics Awareness Workshop" from 21 August to 25 August, 2017 wherein 11 delegates from America shared their views with our students & faculty on various aspects of changing economy of the world.

 - A week-long DGHE sponsored workshop was also organised for the faculty of Commerce, Economics & Management department on the topic "Analytical Techniques for Research" in the month of December-17.
 - A 5 days FDP was organised on the topic "Teaching & Learning through ICT" for teaching staff and another 3 days workshop on ICT usage was conducted for Non-Teaching staff.
 - A one day FDP workshop was organised by the IQAC of the college on 'Significance and Utility of Intellectual Property Rights for Academia in the Present Era' on 17-04-2018.
 - A two day Workshop on 'Character Building and Overall Personality Development' was organised in collaboration with 'Shiksha Sanskriti Utthhan Nyas', New Delhi on 9th & 10th May, 2018.
- 14. In this session 4 UGC/DGHE sponsored conferences & Seminars were organised out of which three conferences by department of Science, Library Science & Maths were organised at International level and one by Economics department at National level.

Winning Edge

(A) SALIENT FEATURES

1. Accessibility Advantage

The college is located in the heart of Ballabgarh city at Tigaon Road. There are innumerable industries in Ballabgarh itself and its surrounding areas, such as Delhi, Noida, Gurgaon, Faridabad. Some of the establishments are of International repute and are exporting goods to many countries of the world. These and other related factors provide very good employment opportunities to the qualified and trained youngmen and women. Similarly, opportunities to start one's own business ventures/establishments are also in plenty.

2. Language Lab

A language lab functions in the college for developing and enhancing the communication skills (reading, writing,

listening and speaking), vital for the present job market of the students. This is done by an able and motivated faculty using audio and video aids, conducting role plays, mimes, debates, group discussions etc. The element of personality development is in-built in the very structure of the course. A Certificate by the College is awarded to the successful candidates. The college charges very nominal fee for meeting the maintenance expenses.



3. Kul Vyavastha (Personal Mentoring)

This is a unique feature of our institution for providing mentoring & counseling to the students at personal level so that apart from education they could be provided friendly support in coping with other societal challenges. Each teacher is entrusted with the responsibility of mentoring two groups of students. It develops a very personal relation between the mentors and the pupils, which contributes immensely in creating an affable environment in the campus at multiple level, motivating the students on various fronts, improving their in and out-class conduct and performance.

4. Industrial Linkages

We have linkages with various industries which help in identifying the job avenues for our students & the skills required by the industries, so that these could be included in their curriculum at the college level.

5. MoUs

Multiple National & International Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) have been entered into with various eminent Industrial, research, academic and corporate sectors by the college in order to provide our students with first hand hands-on training and information for their holistic development.

6. Interface with Eminent Achievers from Various Fields

Leaders and achievers from various fields e.g. public services, community development, human rights, women's rights, civil society (Voluntary Organizations), environment etc. are invited frequently for an interface with the faculty and the students, thus, making them aware of current problems and issues.

7. Community Development Initiatives

Apart from NSS work, our students usually adopt an underdeveloped colony and engage in holding literacy classes, disseminating health awareness, arranging for free education to the poor aspiring students by motivating various educational institutions of the city. It helps in inculcating in them the spirit of voluntary community work, adding new dimensions to their personality and involving them in the process of nation building.

8. Library

There are three ultra modern, well equipped, fully automated libraries in the college. All the three libraries are connected with single server and are equipped with OPAC through which user can search data from any place at any time. The libraries offer Open Access System and has subscription to large number of online Journals/Periodicals and News Papers. Our library is a member of INFLIBNET which provides access to 6000 journals and 113410 books. There is home page for general awareness and have online catalogue of different Universities. The library also boasts of online digital Open Access Repositories of Social Science, Pure Science and Applied Science.



9. In-house Magazine

The College has been publishing regularly an in-house magazine "**Srot**" annually as a platform where the students freely articulate themselves and bring to the fore their innate creative urge. The students basically own the project with the teachers acting only as facilitators.



10. Newsletter

To give a kaleidoscopic view of all the activities being carried out in the college, we publish ACB Newsletter quarterly.

11. Alumni Association

The Alumni Association of the college provides platform to our old students to come together and utilize their varied valuable and rich experience for the development of its members and their alma mater. They provide inputs at various levels. They offer suggestions, assistance, freeships and awards to the needy and meritorious students.



12. NSS

There are three NSS units in our college. These units organize and participate in many programmes such as tree plantation, blood donation, legal rights lectures, creating awareness regarding sanitation, water conservation, proper waste disposal, health and literacy. These units organize talks and lectures on burning issues like AIDS awareness, female foeticide, energy conservation and climate change. NSS units have initiated a noble cause through "Pahunch". Under this initiative, NSS units have adopted a slum area of Patel Nagar Sector-4, Ballabgarh. NSS volunteers are involved in spreading awareness regarding education and cleanliness in the area. Our NSS volunteers not only contribute to programmes related to the service of humanity and teaching the underprivileged students but also participate in various activities and programmes at state and national level.



13. Youth Red Cross

This is a pilot project based on fundamental principles with the theme of "Power of Humanity." Under its banner, youth is being trained on different issues such as humanitarian values, impartiality, voluntary service, climate change, disaster risk reduction, road safety, hygiene and sanitation.

14. NCC

The college has two Naval NCC units for Boys and Girls separately. Apart from getting a feel of the Indian Navy, our cadets learn to lead a disciplined life dedicated to the service and security of the nation. They participate in all the leading camps at state and national level. Now girl cadets will also be benefitted by the award of 'C' certificate which will provide them better opportunities.

15. Outreach Programme

We have also adopted Village Chandawali under University Outreach Programme, a joint venture of MDU Rohtak and our college initiated by Govt. of India & Haryana Govt. The aim of this initiative is to promote the educational institutions and society to work in sync & enhance opportunities for equal growth. Under this programme, the incharges and volunteers of NSS, NCC and Red Cross have been working tirelessly towards sensitizing people on burning issues like health, hygiene, women empowerment, illiteracy, environment & water conservation, deaddiction, etc.

16. Cultural Activities

The college has a long tradition of cultural activities. In the beginning of the session, every year, Talent Hunt is held in various cultural fields. Experts of various fields work with the selected students day and night so as to bring out the best in them and hone their skills.

17. Sports

The college has made a mark in the field of sports not only at the state level but also at the national and international level. The college sports persons have won laurels in games, particularly in Shooting, Wu shu, Taekwondo, Athletics, Basketball, Boxing, Archery,

Baseball, Softball, etc.

18. Excursions

The students are often taken on excursions to familiarise them with the working and procedures of various Govt. Departments. They are also taken on educational visits to places of historical significance and important heritage sites. The students of vocational courses are taken to industries to prepare them for their future careers.

19. Fully Wi-Fi Campus

Our college is fully Wi-Fi enabled campus with 10 Mbps bandwidth leased line that allows convenient, widely available, high-speed access to Internet at any place and time in the campus. It offers students the facilities of E-mail, net surfing, up/down

loading of web-based application, besides helping them in preparing projects & seminars. The Internet access is provided to the students with colossal filtration using Firewalls so that only the educational sites may be accessed.



There are two Research Labs in our college. In Physics Lab Radon (Rn222) & Thoron (Rn220) levels in water, soil and air are measured. Radon Geo Station is also installed in the college by BARC Mumbai. The Lab monitors the data from this Geo Station and this data is continuously transmitted to BARC, Mumbai. It is equipped with muffel furnance, spark counter, olympus microscope, constant temperature etching bath and smart RnDuo. In Chemistry Research Lab Uranium Concentration and other associated water quality parameters i.e. pH, Electrical Conductivity, Total Dissolved Solids, Temperature, Salinity, Dissolved Oxygen are measured. This lab is equipped with LED Fluorimeter, Radiation Monitor, GPS and Water Quality Sensor.



21. Computer Labs

We boast of 12 computer labs with latest technology including I_3 , Thin clients, Internet and Multimedia environment. Different types of softwares are also available in the Labs. Programming languages include Oracle, .NET, PHP, C, C++, Java, Server 2008-2012, MS-Office 2013, Visual Fox Pro, Linux/Unix. Computer labs are fully air-conditioned, highly spacious and



provide a rich environment for healthy interaction between teachers and students. The college has its own Leased line connection which provides 24 hour internet access to the students. In addition to it, the college has 635 computers with latest configurations.

22. Retail Lab

The Retail Lab was inaugurated in the college on 9th March 2016 for the students of UGC-sponsored Course of B.Voc. (Retail Management). The Lab is furnished with all the basic features of a retail store like POS, shelves, counters, billing software, camera surveillance etc.

23. Smart Class Rooms

Our college is committed to support students with Smart Classrooms which include all the necessary equipments to connect to the Internet and display presentation material on a permanent screen using a ceiling mounted projector. There are 31 Smart Classrooms in the Campus. These types of rooms are equipped with various devices such as Projectors, Workstations with Internet Connections, Sound Systems, Document Cameras, Wireless Mike, Interactive Whiteboards, Media Control Systems.

24. Auditorium

For organizing conferences, carnivals and large-scale congregations within the campus, the college has a well-planned air-conditioned seminar hall in the college building that can accommodate over 200 people and a huge Indoor Auditorium that can accommodate over 400 people.



25. Gymnasium

The college has a well-equipped gym where the students can go during their off periods and undertake exercise. This habit of regular exercise is inculcated in them to make them physically fit and active.

26. Cafeteria

The college has a well equipped and well run Cafeteria to meet the requirements of students and staff. All possible steps are taken to ensure that the eatables and beverages served there are upto the mark, the seating arrangements are proper, the charges reasonable, the atmosphere congenial and the highest standards of hygiene adhered to. We have a Canteen Committee to look after these matters.

27. Medical Facility

The college has two medical rooms with all the necessary basic infrastructure and medicines for providing health care facilities to the students. Each student undergoes a mandatory medical check-up at the time of admission.

28. Induction & Farewell Ceremony

To acquaint the freshers with the course and institution, Induction Ceremony in every department is a regular feature in the beginning of the session.

Besides Induction, Farewell Parties for all the outgoing classes (UG and PG) are also organised annually for all the courses separately. These are marked by Ms. Farewell and Mr. Farewell along with many other titles and cultural items.



29. Career and Employment Enhancement Programme (CEEP)

In order to broaden the horizon of learning of students beyond the university curriculum with the objective of enhancing employability of the students, the college has started the above mentioned programme in collaboration with NIIT. The course is of 6 semesters and forms an integral part of their course curriculum. It is compulsory for all UG students of self finance. The course is very useful for the students as on one hand it will train them in soft and behaviourial skills, various computer courses like Tally and on the other hand will ensure final placements to them at the end of the programme.

(B) STUDENT WELFARE SCHEMES

Educational & Financial support to the students belonging to the Weaker Sections of the Society

The students belonging to SC, ST and OBC communities are provided special academic support by holding extra classes for them. Senior and meritorious students along with the faculty are involved in providing them need-based academic support. UGC and State Govt. provide financial aid to the students belonging to SC/ST/BC/OBC/BPL and minority categories.

2. Samarth Scheme

This scheme has been introduced by the College Management for the differently abled students under which fee concessions, scholarships, free books and free stationery is provided. Govt. provides financial aid to the students belonging to SC/ST/BC/OBC/BPL and minority categories. A scholarship of Rs. 1100/- per month is given to such students studying in courses running under SFS. If a student is found guilty of indiscipline or fail to pass the University Exam, scholarship will be terminated. Only University Fee and Curriculum Fee will be charged from students studying in traditional courses..

3. Woollen sweaters to the needy students

In the beginning of the winter season, the needy students are identified and are given woollen sweaters.

Best Student Innovator of the year Award has been instituted by Romesh Chaudhary, CEO of Industrial Systems, 17/6, Mathura Road, Opposite Metro Pillar P-762, Faridabad- 121 002, who has been an alumnus of Aggarwal College Ballabgarh. This award is given to a student every year w.e.f. session 2018-19 who will come out with an Innovative Idea that could be realisedand will be decided by a Committee constituted by Principal after inviting nominations from College Students. The award consists of a GOLD MEDAL (Gold Plated Siver Medal) with a Certificate.

(vi) Means-cum-Merit Scholarship (MMS)

Sh. Pradeep K. Bansal, Chartered Accountant and an Alumnus of the College has declared financial assistance in the form of Means-cum-Merit Scholarships (MMS) to needy Girl Students studying in Aggarwal College Ballabgarh w.e.f. session 2018-19. (C) Societies / Fora / Clubs

We have societies, fora and clubs in different subjects. These help in nurturing students' interest and talents and foster their social and intellectual activities. Besides Women Cell, Red Ribbon Club, Youth Red Cross Club, INTACH Young Heritage Club, Eco Club, Legal Literacy Cell, Science Forum & Social Science Forum, there are English Language Society, Hindi Sahitya Parishad, Swaranjali Musical Society, Computer Forum, Management Forum, Chemical Society, Sanskrit Sahitya Parishad, Physics Association, Commerce Forum, Economics Forum, Pol. Sc. Forum and Mathematics Club in the college. Various activities and functions are organized throughout the year for the holistic development of the students. Glimpses of a few are as under –

1. **Women Cell**

Our College Women Cell is quite active and is continuously sensitizing students by organising various workshops and activities on contextually relevant issues like Health, Education, Security, Legal Rights, Gender Sensitization etc.

2. **English Language Club**

An 'English Language Club <ELC>' has been started in the college with the sole aim of creating confidence among the students in the areas of Phonetics, Spoken English, Pronunciation and Modern English Grammar. It benefits the students in improving their personality and having an edge over other students during English Language Club interviews and competitive examinations.



3. **Eco Club**

Eco Club in our college was established in 2009. This club aims at creating awareness regarding carbon emission and climate change. It encourages the students to plant more and more trees to make our environment pollution free and eco friendly.

4. **Yoga Club**

Yoga Club of the college aims at developing the physical, mental and spiritual health of the students and teachers through various aasans, pranayam and meditation exercises.

5. **INTACH Club**

It conserves all cultural and historical heritages which are not under Archeological Survey of India. The College Club under Faridabad Chapter with the intake of 100 students of History from B.A. has an extraordinary sense of commitment to the cause of heritage conservation. This Club organizes spot painting and declamation competitions to create awareness among the students of the college.

6. Swachchhta Senani Team

Swachchhta Senani Team in the three wings of the college with one coordinator each 50 students each enrolled in it, remains active in organising activities, competitions to create awareness of importance of cleanliness and sanitation.

7. **Legal Literacy Cell**

We have a legal Literacy Cell in our college to make our students aware of their legal rights & duties.

Energy Conservation Club 8.

The purpose of this club is to spread the message of energy conservation among the students in nearby localities through posters and campaigns. Special Talks by experts are organised to create an energy conservation mentality.

9. **Health Awareness Club**

It aims at creating health awareness amongst students and staff. Health Awareness Camps and Health Check up Camps are organised throughout the year.

10. Road Safety Club

Road Safety Club encourages the students to learn the importance of practicing safety norms while driving on the roads. Awareness Talks on road safety and traffic rules and practical sessions are organised under the umbrella of this club.

11. Innovation Hub

Under the banner of 'Innovation Hub', students are encouraged to transform their ideas from imagination to reality.

12. Socio-Cultural and Economic Awareness - Video Club

This club has been constituted with a view that awareness among students can be created towards social, economic and cultural fabric of the city through photographs and videos made by students. Competitions and activities are planned for the same.

(D) BEST PRACTICES

1. House Exams / Class Tests for Internal Assessment

House exams/Class tests are held in each semester for tracking the educational performance of every student and award the internal assessment. The problems and needs of the students who have poor performance are identified by a committee and are addressed by holding special classes for them. Their parents are also informed and involved in the process.

2. Students' Attendance Track Records

All the teachers are required to submit monthly attendance sheets in the office. The students are informed about their attendance record monthly. The parents of the students, who do not fulfil the university rule of mandatory 65% lectures, are informed twice in a session in order to make these students more regular in the classes.

3. Evaluation by Students

When the session is about to conclude, every student is given an evaluation form in which he/she is supposed to fill his/her feedback regarding the various aspects of their individual teacher's communication skills, his/her understanding level of his/her subject, his class room conduct etc. Efforts are made to make the learning process participative, democratic and student-friendly, exposing them to the latest techniques & methods adopted for training by various UN organizations, development agencies and experts like Paolo Freire and Robert Chamber etc. This feedback is tabulated by a committee and the findings are shared in an affable way with the concerned teacher by the Principal privately so that the concerned teacher could improve his/her class room performance by adding necessary inputs.

4. Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell

Being a very sensitive and burning issue of the day, the college has Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell. It ensures protection and safety of the women.

5. Anti-Ragging Cell

This Cell is constituted on the guidelines of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India's ruling and UGC regulations on curbing the menace of ragging in Educational Institutions. Our Institute is free from this menace because of the active cooperation of the faculty, students and support staff.

6. Syllabi / Curricula

At the commencement of the academic session, the students are provided with a soft copy that contains the syllabus, the lesson plans, the pattern of the expected annual question papers and the number of lectures allotted to every topic/Chapter. It helps the faculty and the students to plan systematically for teaching and better learning of the concerned content. It enhances their performance level. The same is also available on the college website **www.aggarwalcollege.org**

7. Faculty Development Programme

In this postmodern age, as the great French thinker Lyotard said "Knowledge is being produced at a mind boggling & stunning pace and the faculty needs to be updated consistently about various issues and their subjects". Keeping this in mind, the college frequently organizes Faculty Development Programmes in the form of one/two day workshops, orientation programmes, seminars and conferences on its own and invites resource persons & eminent scholars from various fields for interacting with the faculty.

8. Parent - Teacher Meetings

We also acknowledge parents as one of the most important stake holders. The faculty holds regular meetings with them to get their feedback and inform them about the progress level of their wards.

9. Academic and Administrative Audit

Besides financial audit, Academic and Administrative Audit is carried out every year for quality sustenance and enhancement in academics.

10. Moral Education

To imbibe moral values and inculcate the trait of humanity among our students, motivational discourses by distinguished scholars and personalities are arranged in the college from time to time.

11. Eco-Friendly Energy Initiatives

Drives targeting Water Conservation and Garbage Disposal are also a part of Co-curricular activities in the campus. Such drives create social awareness regarding proper utilization of electricity, water, road and basic amenities. The volunteers of NSS, NCC and YRC are involved in these.

12. Optimizing Academic Talent

In order to boost the morale and confidence of the senior students of PG classes, they are roped into teaching students of UG classes. They can take their classes in their vacant periods and get suitable honorarium.

13. Book Fair

Books are a person's best friends. So every year Book Fair is organised twice or thrice in which books on all subjects by renowned publishers, who introduce their latest publications for the benefit of book lovers, are displayed.

14. Shaheedi Raahat Kosh

The donations received in Shaheedi Raahat Kosh are utilized to pay financial assistance to the families of soldiers who have sacrificed their lives for the nation.

15. Green / Energy Audit

Green/Energy audit is in place. It is carried out to check the proper implementation of the objectives of Green Initiatives & Energy Conservation. The recommendations of the audit agency are followed and implemented.

16. Anaemia Prevention

To reduce the prevalence & severity of Anaemia, Anaemia Prevention Camps are organised periodically for the girl students to create awareness about anaemia. Iron supplements are distributed among them from time to improve their health.

17. Special Sanitation for Girl Students

To improve personal hygiene and provide sanitation facilities to the girl students, sanitary napkins vending machines and incinerators have been installed in the campus.

18. Suggestion Box

There is a suggestion box in the Campus. Suggestions of the students are received and action is taken accordingly. The student, whose suggestion is considered the best, is awarded at the end of the academic session.

(E) Student Support Services

1. Free Coaching Classes for NET (UGC/CSIR) Examination

The college is running PG Courses in the subjects of Physics, Economics, Hindi, Computer Science, Mathematics, Chemistry, English and Commerce. Most of the students want to pursue career in Teaching at Higher Education institutions. Keeping this in view, the college has started free coaching classes for NET Examination for students belonging to SC/ST/BC and minority, as qualifying this test is a mandatory condition for becoming a teacher in a college or in a university. These classes are run under the aegis of UGC, New Delhi and are subject to permission in financial assistance. The classes are run after the college hours or on Sundays or holidays.

The students who register themselves for these classes are also provided relevant books and study material (subject to permission in financial assistance) Dr. Manoj Shukla is the Coordinator.

2. Free Coaching Classes for Entering into Services

There are a number of opportunities for entry into Government Services after +2 examination and Graduation. A large number of students apply for these jobs in Public Sectors. Keeping in view the demand and interest of the students, the college has started free coaching classes for preparation of various examinations conducted by Staff Selection Commission, IBPS and other Public Services.

Dr. Ram Chander is the Coordinator of these classes which are run under the aegis of UGC, New Delhi.

3. Remedial Coaching Classes

There are a number of students who do not perform well in class tests and are in need of extra coaching. The college has started Remedial Coaching Classes for the students of SC/BC/ST and Minority sections. These classes are run after the college hours. The students attending these classes are also provided study material, books and stationery. This year, the students of B.A. and B.Com. attended these classes. Dr. Naresh Kamra is the Coordinator.

4. Bridge Course and Extra Classes for Slow & Advanced Learners

At the commencement of every academic session, the students of I semester of all streams are given basic knowledge of graduation course to follow under the Bridge Course. Students are prepared for an altogether different curriculum that they are going to study in graduation under this course.

In the beginning of a session, after a fortnight, a class test is conducted for the students. On the basis of their results, slow learners and advanced learners are identified and extra classes for the same are conducted on regular basis.

5. Earn while you Learn Scheme

There are a number of meritorious students belonging to economically weaker sections and are in need of financial support. The college has started a scheme entitled "Earn while you Learn" under which concerned HoDs recommend such needy students who want to work under this scheme. These students work in the college office after the classes or during their free periods. These students are given financial assistance on hourly basis.

Code of Conduct for Students

The College expects the students to adopt a target-oriented, mature and professional approach to their studies and their general conduct around the college. We expectstudents to abide by the Code of Conduct as given below:

- Every student is required to wear his/her Identity Card visibly/well-displayed at all times during college hours.
 Unable to produce the Identity Card, issued by the College or refusing to produce it On Demand by Campus Security Guards or other authorities will be deemed an offence.
- 2. Students should dress in a dignified manner that is appropriate and suitable for an Academic Environment.
- 3. Students are not permitted to use the mobile phone within the Campus. Switch off mobile phones on the college campus and keep them out of sight in the classes.
- 4. Students are expected to keep the campus neat and clean. Do not drop or leave litter around the college campus and put it into the dust bins.
- 5. Students are expected to treat all members of the college community with honour, respect and courtesy.
- 6. Students are not allowed to bring Non-students/ Visitors on to the college campus. Unauthorised visitors should be immediately reported to a member of the staff/ College Security Guards.
- 7. Students should not loiter in the corridors/ outside the class-rooms during the classes.
- 8. Smoking, consumption of intoxicants (an alcoholic drink or drug), chewing of Tobacco, Pan Masala, Gutka etc. and Gums is banned in all spaces throughout the college and immediately outside the college entrances.
- 9. Students should not indulge in any anti-social or criminal activity within or outside college, which may tarnish the image of the college.
- 10. Students are prohibited to use college facilities to send or view any obscene, offensive or illegal material.
- 11. Students are expected to switch off the lights, fans and other electric equipments/ gadgets when not in Use.
- 12. Organising Meetings and Processions on the campus and immediately outside the Entrances of the College without the written permission of Principal is strictly prohibited.
- 13. Stealing, Misusing, Defacing, Damaging or Destroying the college property will be severely dealt with.
- 14. Indiscipline during any Activity/ Functions of the college will be viewed very seriously subject to exemplary punishment.
- 15. Students are required not to interact on behalf of the college with media representatives or invite media persons on to the college campus without the written permission of the Principal.
- 16. Students should read the College Notice Boards daily on entering and before leaving the college and open their E-mail account to get information regarding important instructions/ orders issued by the Principal.
- 17. Students should not waste Drinking Water. Turn off the taps after the Use. Do not leave the taps dripping or flowing.
- 18. Bullying, assaulting intimidating, on threatening any member of the college community will be treated as an offence.
- 19. Misbehaviour with girls will be considered as a serious case of Misconduct. Give them priority for Entering and Leaving the classes without any obstructions.
- 20. Students are expected to be Environment-friendly. Conserve the greenery of the college campus.
- 21. Students are permitted to park their Registered Vehicles on the 'Parking Zone' reserved for them only during College Timings. The Wearing of Helmet/Protective Headgear is **Mandatory** for Two Wheeler Riders.
 - If any student fails to comply with the code of conduct or fails to observe any aspect of the code of conduct, strict disciplinary action may be taken against her/him by the Principal. Principal is the final authority to suspend or to expel the student violating any of the rules of the College and instructions displayed on the Notice Boards or communicated through E-mailfrom time to time. Heavy penalty/fine will be imposed on the students violating the rules and regulations of the college.

General Terms & Conditions

- 1. As per Govt. directions, there is centralized on-line admission in all colleges of the state for all the 1st year and 2nd year courses at UG & PG levels. The students apply directly online to Director Higher Education On-Line Portal. Applying for admission does not automatically entitle a student to get admission.
- 2. A copy of admission/information brochure containing an admission form & other details can be obtained from the college office on payment of Rs. 500/- in cash. Students shall fill up the admission form in his/her handwriting strictly according to qualifying examination and submit the same to the college office at the time of admission.
- 3. The attested copies (3 sets) of Matric & other qualifying examinations should be enclosed with the admission form with two recent passport size photographs and character certificate from the Institution last attended. The candidate shall submit the attested photocopy of proof of Date of Birth alongwith Admission Form. Photocopy of the Voter Identity Card and Aadhaar Card is also required. In case an admission seeker does not have the Voter Identity Card, he/she must fill up Form No. 6 supplied with the Admission Form and submit the same with Admission Form.
- 4. The college will not be responsible if the admission of any student is not confirmed by M.D. University, Rohtak. The M.D. University rules regarding admission will be applicable to all students and if any change is made by the university at any stage in the said rules, it will be binding on the students.
- 5. Students from other board/university seeking admission in this college will have to produce, at the time of verification of documents, original certificates of all the examinations passed prior to the classes which they intend to join, original Inter-University/Board migration certificate, character certificate and school/college leaving certificate from the Principal of the institution last attended and the Detailed Marks Card/Certificate of the qualifying Examination. However, if they are admitted provisionally in the absence of any of the above documents, they will have to deposit all the original certificates with the college office within one month from the date of admission, failing which they will themselves be responsible for depositing such documents in the university.
- 6. If the certificates and degrees of a candidate are found to be fake or the institutions are found to be not recognized by the designated authorities, their admission will be cancelled and the college will not be responsible for any consequential effects.
- 7. The University Roll Numbers will not be given to the students unless they are registered with M.D. University through the college office.
- 8. The students are advised to keep with themselves a photocopy of any document submitted to the college office at the time of admission or later during the year.
- All the final year students who wish to attend the Convocation Function of the college will have to attend the rehearsal. No graduate/postgraduate passout will be allowed to attend the Convocation Function without attending the rehearsal.
- 10. Refund of fee, if any, will be as per M.D. University rules. No student will be permitted to leave the college until he or she has cleared all dues.
- 11. Security fund of Rs. 500/- will lapse after 31st March of the succeeding academic year. Security against library books (Rs. 2000/-) will be deducted 10% after 31st March and 10% will be deducted every financial year.
- 12. In all matters not covered by the rules given in the Admission Brochure, the Principal's decision shall be final.
- 13. Hepatitis-B vaccination is a must for every student.

PROCEDURE FOR ADMISSION

There is Online Admission process and admission will be strictly on the basis of merit unless or otherwise there are any new guidelines from the government. In case the %age of marks in the qualifying examination is same, the candidate senior in age will be preferred. Failed students shall not be admitted.

Compartment cases are not allowed admission in any UG/PG course.

MODE OF PAYMENT OF FEE

The selected candidates will have to deposit their fees in the Bank i.e. **Punjab National Bank, AVPS, Ballabgarh,** after getting the Bank Fee Slip from the College office. After depositing fees in the Bank, the student will have to submit one copy of Bank Receipt immediately to the college office to get class Roll Number. **The fees for the even semesters will be charged while issuing no dues for the odd semester examinations.**

The student will be allowed to take classes in even semesters (II, IV & VI) only when he/she produces his/her no dues receipt of previous semester.

Note: The reservation of seats is as per Reservation Policy of the State Govt. of Haryana and is subject to change/amendment made by the State Govt. from time to time.

In the event of quota reserved for Physically Handicapped remain unutilized due to non availability of suitable category of handicapped candidates, it may be offered to Ex- Servicemen and their wards (1% and the dependant of Freedom Fighter 1%). Further, 3% reservation is also provided to Ex-serviceman/ Freedom Fighter and their dependants by providing reservation within reservation of 1% of General Category, 1% out of Scheduled Caste and 1% from Backward Classes category for admission to the various educational institutions of the Govt. and Govt. aided / Institutes located in Haryana. As far as Block allocation in Block-A and Block-B of Backward Classes category is concerned year wise rotational system will be adopted. For example if Block-A of Backward Classes are given seats in academic year 2013, the next Block i.e. (B) Block of Category of Backward Classes will be given seats in the next academic year 2014 and so on.

Note: A roster register for reservation of seats for ex-servicemen/freedom fighter shall be maintained and carry forward all fractions till one seat is accumulated through different fractions over the years. As and when the total comes to one, a seat will be provided in the Prospectus (Chief Secretary to Govt. Haryana letter No. 23/27/2004-2GS-III dated 05.12.2008).

II. Guidelines for Reservation

- 1. A candidate, who applies for a reserved category or for both reserved and general categories, will be considered first in general category. In case, he is not selected in general category, he/she will be considered for reserved category.
 - The Scheduled Castes/Backward Classes candidates who get selected /admitted in Educational/Professional/ Technical Institutions and Universities in open competition on the basis of their own merit, will not be counted against the quota reserved for scheduled caste/ backward classes, rather they will be treated as open competition candidates. However, such candidates shall fulfill condition of eligibility regarding age etc. as are meant for general category candidates (Memo No.13864-75 dated 24.8.2012 received from the Principal Secretary to Govt. of Haryana, Welfare of Scheduled Caste and Backward Classes Department, Chandigarh).
- 2. Benefit of reservation will be given to all the reserved categories upto 3rd counselling according to the reservation policy given in the Information Brochure. In case at the time of 3rd counselling the reserved seats of various categories remain vacant and no eligible candidates of the reserved categories are available, these vacant seats may be thrown open to Haryana General Category. In case, the seats in Haryana General Category remain vacant at the end, the same will be thrown open to All India Open Category.
- 3. If any seat remains vacant in sub-categories of BC(A) and BC(B), the same will be filled up through the candidates belonging to other category. For example, if any seat in BC(B) category remains vacant, the same will be filled up from BC(A) category and vice-versa.
- 4. A candidate having a minimum of 40% permanent disability will be considered physically handicapped for admission to a course, provided that the candidate is otherwise medically fit for the particular course. Such candidate will be admitted to the relevant courses on the basis of academic merit and not on the basis of degree of handicap. Certificate should be as per Appendix-"A".

Note: Criteria for benefit of reservation to Ex-Serviceman is available in appendix "E"

Above Weightage(s) shall be given subject to the following conditions.

- ii) Only those candidates who have passed their Secondary Examination or Senior Secondary Examination (10+2) as regular students from schools/colleges situated in rural area of Haryana are entitled for the Rural Area Weightage except All India quota. Such candidates must produce a certificate to this effect as per Appendix-H.
- iii) Candidate claiming sports weightage must submit certificate issued by the Director of Sports of the State concerned indicating grades. Certificate from any other Authority will not be considered.
- iv) Candidates claiming blood donation weightage must submit certificate issued by the Red Cross Society / Official Blood Bank.

4. Admission Against Supernumerary seats in the category of Outstanding Sports Seats

Conditions for admission against sports seats (PG Courses):

One seat in each PG Course (except the courses in which the admissions are made on centralized basis at state level) in the College/Institute where the strength is upto 30 and 2 seats where the strength is more than 30 have been earmarked for outstanding sports person (s) over and above the sanctioned intake. The eligibility criteria will be as under:-

(i) The Candidates should fulfil the minimum eligibility conditions prescribed in the Admission Brochure/Ordinances.

(ii) **Cat. A-I:**

- (i) The Candidates should have won Ist, IInd, IIIrd position in Olympic Games, World Championship, World Cup, World University Games, Devis Cup, Wimbledon Championship, U.S., French and Australian Open Tennis Championship, Thomas Cup, Uber Cup, All England Badminton Tournament.
- (ii) Participation in the above mentioned tournaments.

Cat. A-II:

- (i) Ist, IInd, IIIrd position in Champions Trophy, Common Wealth Games, Common Wealth Championships, Asian Games, Asian Championships, Asian Cup, World University Championship, Cricket Test Matches, One Day International Cricket Matches, International Athletic Permit Meet and SAF Games.
- (ii) Participation in the above mentioned in A-II point.

Cat. B:

- (i) Ist, IInd, IIIrd position in AIIU tournaments/Nationa Games/National Championships/Federation Cup organized by National Sports Federations recognized by the Govt. of India.
- (ii) Participation in the above mentioned in B-category.

Cat. C:

- (i) Ist, IInd, IIIrd positions in zonal inter-university tournaments/zonal national tournaments/representation of AIIU team.
- (ii) The eligibility rules for the admission against sports seat, only the games recognized and adopted by the Inter University Sports Board of India and approved by AIU will be considered. List of games approved by AIU is appended at `F'.
- (iii) The candidates should be eligible for Inter-Varsity Tournaments during the year of admission.
- (iv) There should be continuity of participation of the applicant at various levels including Inter-Varsity Tournaments and his performance should not be more than one year old.
- (v) The candidate better in sports will be admitted as per merit.
- (vi) The merit list prepared by the colleges for admission against Sports Seats will be got approved from the Committee consisting of the Director (Sports), HOD (Physical Education) and one of the teachers of Department of Physical Education of the college before making such admissions.
- (vii) In case of tie in sports merit, the candidate better in academic merit will be given preference.
- (viii) The age of the student should not exceed 28 years.
- (ix) The sports certificate and photograph of the player must be attested by the Secretary of the concerned federation.
- (x) The candidates must possess the gradation certificate (other than University Tournaments) from the Sports Dept. of his/her state, on the basis of his/her representation/position at National/Inter-National / Zonal/State level in the games recognized by AIU from time to time.
- (xi) In case, there is no availability of Coach in the University, for the game in which the student is seeking admission, then University will hire the services of the Coach from Sports Department of Haryana.
- (xii) Only those games which are recognized and adopted by the Inter-University Sports Board of India and approved by AIU will be considered for determining admission against sports seat.
- (xiii) It will be mandatory for the admitted students to participate in the Sports activities of his/her Department/University and should have consistently participated in Sports activities.

NOTE:

Application form received for outstanding Sports Quota seat upto last date of applying for admission, shall be sent to the Dean, Faculty of Education within three days after the 3rd counseling of the concerned College/Institute. Thereafter, the Committee will recommend his/her case for admission within ten days after the 3rd counseling. No late fee shall be charged from such students. Applications received after the last date of submission of application forms for Sports Quota Seat shall not be considered under any circumstances.

5. Conditions for admission against sports seats (UG Courses):-

One seat in each course (over and above the sanctioned intake) where the sanctioned intake is 30 seats and two seats where the sanctioned intake is more than 30 will be earmarked in B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. and all other UG Courses (excluding Technical Professional Courses) subject to the following conditions:-

- i) The Candidates should fulfill the minimum eligibility conditions prescribed in the Admission Brochure/Ordinances.
- ii) I/II/III position/participation at the School National Tournaments.
- iii) I/II/III position/participation at the School National Games and Sports.
- iv) I/II/III position holder at the State Level Tournaments.
- v) The candidate better in sports will be admitted as per merit decided by the Director (Sports) of the University on the basis of criteria to be laid down for sports merit.
- vi) In case of tie in sports merit, the candidate better in academic merit must be given preference.
- vii) The age of the student should not exceed 23 years.
- viii) It will be mandatory for the admitted students to participate in the sports activities of his/her Department/College/Institution and should have consistently participated in the sports activities.

6. Admission for Kashmiri Migrants

Two additional seats in each course offered in the Colleges/Institutes (except the courses being run under the norms of BCI and NCTE and the admissions are made on centralized basis at state level) shall be earmarked for Kashmiri Migrants. Admission against these seats shall be made on the basis of merit of qualifying examination. Candidates are required to apply to the concerned College/Institute by the date notified in the schedule of admission.

7. Admission against Supernumerary Cultural Activities Seats

One supernumerary seat in each College/Intitute will be earmarked to promote cultural activities subject to the fulfilment of the following conditions :

- i) Any position in the National Youth Festival organized by the Association of Indian Universities, New Delhi.
- ii) First position holder in the North Zone Inter University Youth Festival organized by the Association of Indian Universities.
- iii) The age of the student should not exceed 23 years.
- iv) It will be mandatory for the admitted students to participate in the cultural activities of his/her College/Institute and should have consistently participated in the youth festivals.
- v) The maximum age limit to participate in the Youth Festival of MDU and Association of Indian Universities is 25 years. So if a student takes admission in any College/Institute at the age of 23 years, she can participate for next two years as per rules.

PARKING RULES

Those students who bring Cycle/Motorcycle/Scooter will have to pay the parking fees as under.

1. Cycle Rs. 400/- P.A.

2. Motorcycle / Scooter Rs. 1000/- P.A. (Helmet compulsory) (Bullet Motorcycle not allowed)

The students are required to get the parking token from office at the time of admission, if they need parking for their vehicles in the college parking slot.

Car/Jeep and other 4-Wheelers are not allowed.

The college will not be responsible for damage/loss of vehicle.

Public Transport - Bus / Railway Pass

Application for Bus/Railway Passes are entertained after the admission in the month of July.

- a) For boy students, the passes are valid for one year as per Haryana Roadways Rules.
- b) For girl students, the passes are free and are renewed after six months.
- c) There is also a provision for Railway Passes on monthly or Half yearly basis.
- d) **Shuttle Bus Service**: From the academic session 2016-17, the college provides shuttle bus service from Wing-I and Wing-III to Wing-II to and fro. This facility is only for girl students. This facility can be availed by paying nominal charges.

LIBRARY RULES

- (i) Library Books will be issued to a student on a library card.
- (ii) A library card will be issued to a student on showing his/her college identity card to the librarian. Without the identity card the library card will not be issued. The identity card/Library card (s) will be issued to a student only once at the time of admission in the college. The same will be valid throughout his/her stay in the college.
- (iii) Every student will be issued books for the session from the library after depositing the security amount. Security against library books (Rs. 2000/-) will be deducted 10% after 31st March and 10% will be deducted every financial year.
- (iv) Reference Books, rare books and periodicals are not to be issued. These books can only be given for consultation in the library.
- (v) Daily news papers and magazines can be read only in the library.
- (vi) The books issued from the library must be kept carefully and should not be underlined or damaged. The books should be checked before getting issued, if damaged it should be brought to the notice of the librarion otherwise the borrower will have to pay double the price of the book.
- (vii) If a student keeps the book for more than one month of the given date, the matter will be reported to the Principal for necessary action.
- (viii) The students are expected to observe perfect silence in the library.
- (ix) In case a student loses a book, he/she must inform the librarian immediately who will direct the student to deposit a new book and fine as per rules. The student must also pay the fine by the fixed date.
- (x) It is mandatory for a student to keep her/his Identity Card with her/him on the campus and produce it on demand by a staff member.
- (xi) In case a student loses the library card/Identity card he/she must inform the librarian immediately about it. In such a case the card will be re-issued on the payment of Rs. 100/- and on producing copy of Police F.I.R/an affidavit. The student will have to give it in writing that he/she will be responsible for the issued books on the lost library card.
- (xii) A book can be taken back on the direction of the librarian if necessary.
- (xiii) Every student has to visit the library in the allotted period and has to make his entry in the entry register.

ELIGIBILITY CONDITION TO APPEAR FOR UNIVERSITY EXAMINATION

For appearing in the University Examination a student will have to fulfill the following conditions:

- 1. He/she must have attended atleast 65% of the lectures delivered in each subject of Theory and Practical separately.
- 2. He/she must have obtained pass marks in each subject in class tests.
- 3. He/she must have obtained pass marks in internal assessments. In case of M.Sc.(Comp.Sc.)/M.Com./M.A. Economics/M.A. (English)/M.Sc. (Maths), M.Sc. (Physics) & M.Sc. (Chemistry) the student will have to attend atleast 65% in Theory and 65% in Practical of total lectures delivered separately.
- 4. If as a result of re-evaluation a student passes the lower examination or is placed under compartment he may be allowed admission to next higher class only if he is able to complete at least 50% of total lectures/Practical classes delivered and a seat is available and also such a student is otherwise eligible. In addition such a student will be required to attend 65% lectures to be delivered from the actual date of his admission till the end of the session. In genuine cases, the Principal of the College can condone deficiency of lectures in various courses run in affiliated colleges upto 20%. If the Principal of the College is not satisfied with the reasons for the shortage given by a student, it is not obligatory on his/her part to condone the shortage. The decision of the Principal of the College in the matter shall be final. Below 45% of attendance, the student will in no case be allowed to appear for University Examination.
- 5. A student who has been detained due to shortage of attendance shall not be allowed to get promoted to the next semester and he/she will be required to take readmission in accordance with the university rules.

Criteria of Internal Assessment for U.G. Courses

Seminar Presentation, Class Participation & Assignments

The Internal assessment has been made applicable to the students admitted from academic session 2005-06 onwards. The criteria for Internal Assessment is 20 marks or 20% of theory papers and this applies to all I, II, III, IV,V & VI Semesters of all U.G. Programs. These 20 marks shall be calculated on the following basis.

BAN ON RAGGING IN EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

The instructions for curbing ragging as conveyed by the UGC vide letter No. 1-15/2009 (ARC) pt. III dated 17.03.2017, in view of the judgement of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India dated 08.05.2009 in Civil Appeal No. 887/2009.

Ragging in educational institutions is banned and any one indulging in ragging is likely to be punished appropriately. The punishment may include

- (I) Expulsion / suspension from the institution or classes for a limited period or fine with a public apology.
- (ii) Withholding or withdrawing scholarships or fellowships and other benefits.
- (iii) Forfeiting campus placement opportunities or recommendations.
- (iv) Debarring from appearing in any test or examination or other evaluation process.
- (v) Debarring from representing the educational institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- (vi) Withholding results.
- (vii) Suspension or expulsion from hostel or mess.
- (viii) Cancellation of admission.
- (ix) Lodging of FIR with the local police.
- (x) If the individuals committing or abetting ragging are not/cannot be identified, collective punishment can be awarded to act as a deterrent.

THE FOLLOWING WILL BE TERMED AS THE ACT OF RAGGING

Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other students, indulging in rowdy or indisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear apprehension thereof in freshers or junior students or asking the students to do any act or perform something which such students will not do in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame of embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student or any type of abuse through electronic media or wrongful confinement, use of criminal force, assault as well as sexual offence, trespass, defamation or threat to defame will be deemed an act of ragging.

Fee Concession, Scholarship & Other Financial Aids

The college grants fee concession to financially weaker but deserving students. Brilliant students are also given suitable incentives and concessions by the college. Applications for Merit and Merit-cum-Means Scholarship are invited in due course about which the students are duly notified.

There is a provision for Students Aid Fund in the college. This funds helps the poor and meritorious needy students for purchasing books, meeting their expenses of tuition fee, University fee and other needs.

Financial assistance is available to the students under the following schemes of the Govt. of India and Govt. of Haryana. The needy students should contact the college office for details regarding the following schemes. The students can contact Dr. Naresh Kamra and Dr. Ram Chander regarding these schemes.

1. Concession to Meritorious Students:

The students securing 1st Position in the University examination will be given admission to next class with 100% concession, those securing 2nd Position will be given 50% concession and those securing 3rd Position will be given 25% concession. Those securing 4th Position will be given 20% concession in development fund/tuition fees whichever is higher. This concession is excluding University Funds.

2. Samarth Yojna:

Aggarwal Vidya Pracharni Sabha has introduced a special scheme for differently-abled students of the college under which they will be provided scholarship of Rs. 1100/- per month and free books.

3. Govt. of India Post Matric Scholarship Scheme:

This scheme is only for the students belonging to Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe/OBC. Those students can avail this facility whose parents' total income from all sources does not exceed Rs. 2,50,000/- per annum for SC/ST and Rs. 1,00,000 for OBC. Maximum two wards of the same parents can avail this scholarship. This number limitation does not apply to girls. The head of the institute is final authority to sanction this scholarship. For this the students are advised to visit website **www.scholarships.gov.in**

4. Govt. of India Post Matric Scheme for lower income group students:

Under this scheme, some limited scholarships are available to the eligible students in general category on the basis of the income of their parents.

5. State Harijan Welfare Scheme for backward classes:

The students belonging to recognized backward classes and whose parents' annual income does not exceed Rs. 100000/- per annum are eligible for stipend under this scheme.

6. Promotion of Science Education (POSE)

Scholarship Scheme for students of UG Science courses.

In order to encourage meritorious students towards science education, the Department of Science & Technology, Govt. of Haryana, started a scholarship scheme w.e.f. 2009-10 for the Under Graduate B.Sc. 7. Central Sector, Scheme for Scholarship for College and University Students

Important Information & Instructions for Students

- 1. The prospectus provides general information on rules and regulations of the college and university. It cannot be used as a legal document.
- 2. The college will not be responsible if M.D.University, Rohtak, does not confirm the admission of any student.
- If the certificates and degrees of a candidate are found to be fake or the institutions are found to be not recognized by the designated authorities, their admission will be cancelled and the college will not be responsible for any consequential effects.
- 4. The University Roll Numbers will not be given to the students unless they are registered with M.D. University through the college office.
- 5. Refund of fee, if any, will be as per M.D. University rules. No student will be permitted to leave the college until he or she has cleared all dues.
- 6. Students, who leave the college, can take back their security amount from the month of September to 31st March during the succeeding academic session only. It will lapse after 31st March. Identity Card must be submitted at the time of refund of security money.
- 7. Classes of B.Sc. (Hons) Maths, B.Sc. Physics & Chemistry, B.Sc.Non-Medical/Electronics/Computer Science Part-I, II & III and M.Sc. Chemistry & Physics will be held in Wing-II.
- 8. All final year students who wish to attend the Convocation Function of the college will have to attend the Rehearsal. No graduate or PG will be allowed to attend the function without attending the rehearsal.
- 9. Ragging is strictly prohibited. Defaulters shall invite strict disciplinary action including rustication from the college.
- 10. It all the matters not covered by the rules given in the Admission Brochure, the decision of the Principal will be final.
- 11. Hepatitis-B vaccination is a must for every student.

Admission & Promotion Criteria for various UG/PG Courses

(A) Eligibility Conditions for Admission to B.Voc./B.A./B.Sc./B.Com

No one shall be eligible to join Ist year class of B.Voc./B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. unless:

- I) He/She has passed one of the following examinations with atleast 33% marks in aggregate for admission to B.A. Part-I, 40% for admission to B.Voc./B.Com. Part-I & 45% for admission to B.Sc. Part-I. The candidates belonging to SC/ST category who secure minimum pass marks in qualifying examination may be considered eligible on the basis of merit for admission in the affiliated colleges.
- ii) Senior Secondary Certificate examination (10+2) of Haryana School Education Board, Bhiwani.

OR

iii) Diploma in Pharmacy course for (B.A./B.Sc.-I only)

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- iv) Three year professional diploma programmes conducted by the state board of Technical Education without passing English and Hindi subjects at 10+2 level for admission to B.A./B.Sc./B.Com courses.
- (B) Eligibility Conditions for Admission to B.C.A./B.B.A./B.B.A. (CAM)/B.A. (Hons)/B.Com. (Hons)/B.Com. (Computer Application)/B.Sc. (Hons)/B.Sc. (Non-Medical) with Computer Science/Electronics/Chemistry Courses
- 1. No one shall be eligible to join I year class of B.C.A. unless:
 - a) He/she has passed Senior Secondary Examination (10+2) of Board of School Education Haryana, Bhiwani with 45% marks in aggregate or an equivalent examination recognized by this university.

OR

- b) Three year diploma course from Polytechnic(after 10^{th} class) or any other exams recognized as equivalent thereto by the State Board of Technical Education Haryana.
- 2. No one shall be eliqible to join I year class of B.B.A./B.B.A. (CAM) unless:
 - a) He/she has passed Senior Secondary Examination (10+2) of Board of School Education Haryana, Bhiwani with 45% marks in aggregate or an equivalent examination recognized by this university.

OR

- b) Three year professional diploma programmes conducted by the State Board of Technical Education without passing English and Hindi subjects at 10+2 level for admission to B.B.A./B.B.A. (CAM) course or any other Board recognized by any State Government or Union Territory.
- 3. No one shall be eligible to join I year class of B.Com. (Computer Application)/B.Sc. with Computer Science/Electronics Course unless:
 - (I) He/She has passed one of the following examinations with 40% for admission to B.Com. (Computer Application) Part-I & 45% for admission to B.Sc. with Computer Science/Electronics Part-I.
 - a) Senior Secondary Certificate examination (10+2) of Haryana School Education Board, Bhiwani

OR

- b) Three year professional diploma programmes conducted by the State Board of Technical without passing English and Hindi subjects at 10+2 level for admission to B.Com. (Computer science/Electronics courses.
- c) Any other examination recognized by the Academic Council equivalent to (a) or (b) above.
- 4. No one shall be eligible to join I year (Sem.I) of class *B.A. (Hons) Economics, B.Com. (Hons), B.Sc. (Hons) Physics, *B.Sc. (Hons) Chemistry, B.Sc. (Hons) Maths course unless he/she has passed.
 - a) Senior Secondary Certificate (10+2) examination of Board of School Education Haryana, Bhiwani with 45% marks in aggregate.

OR

b) Any other examination recognised by the University as equivalent thereto.

Promotion under semester system

- (I) The candidate will be allowed to appear in the examination if he/she meets the following requirements:
 - a) Bears a good character
 - b) Has been on the rolls of the department during the semester/year.
 - c) Has attended not less than 65% of lectures delivered in theory as well as practical.
 - d) Has secured minimum 40% marks in the Internal assessment in each subject.
- NOTE-1 The duration of the course of B.B.A. / B.B.A. (CAM) / B.C.A., B.Com. (Computer Application), B.Com. (Hons), B.A. (Hons) Economics, B.Sc. with Computer Science/Electronics, B.Sc. (Hons) Physics, B.Sc. (Hons) Chemistry, B.Sc. (Hons) Maths shall be three academic years i.e. 6 semesters. (i) The maximum period in which a candidate must qualify for the degree shall be six years. If a student passes an examination in the last year of total duration, he/she will not get any regular chance for improvement. (ii) After passing an examination, the student will be allowed two chances for improvement (subject to (i) above) i.e. one chance for odd semesters and second chance for even semesters. The result will be revised after second chance is over. The examination of odd semesters shall be held in the month of November/December and examination of even semester shall be held in the month of May/June each year.
- **NOTE-2** Minimum pass % for UG classes is 40% in theory, 40% in Internal separately and 40% in aggregate.
- **NOTE-3** The candidates belonging to SC/ST category who secure minimum pass marks in qualifying examination may be considered eligible on the basis of merit for admission in the affiliated colleges.
- NOTE-4 The candidate having compartment in the qualifying examination will not be allowed admission to UG courses.
- **NOTE-5** The re-appear examination of the students will be held with regular even and regular odd semester examinations. However, the re-appear examinations of the last two semesters will be held simultaneously
- **NOTE-6** For details refer to University Ordinance for the concerned course at **www.mdurohtak.ac.in**
- **NOTE-7** Failed students will not be readmitted in the college.

(C) Eligibility Conditions for Admission to M.A. (Hindi), M.A. (English), M.A. (Economics) M.Com., M.A., M.Sc. (Maths), M.Sc. (Computer Sc.), M.Sc. (Physics) & M.Sc. (Chemistry) Courses

- 1. No one shall be eligible to join I year class of M.A. (Hindi), M.A. (English) or M.A. (Economics) unless: He/She has passed Bachelor's degree/ Shastri Examination (New Scheme) of 3 years duration with atleast 45% marks in aggregate or any other examination recognized as equivalent thereto
- **NOTE:** A person who has passed PG exams shall not ordinarily be allowed to seek admission to another PG course except on permission to be accorded by the Vice-Chancellor on genuine grounds.
 - 2. No one shall be eligible to join I year class of M.Com. unless:
 - He/She has passed B.Com. (Hons/Pass)/B.B.A. or B.A. with Economics/Commerce/Marketing/ Insurance as a subjects with atleast 45% marks in aggregate or any other examination recognized by the M.D. University, Rohtak as equivalent thereto.
 - 3. No one shall be eligible to join I year class of M.A./M.Sc. Maths unless:
 - He/She has passed B.A./B.Sc.(Hons) in Mathematics/B.A. or B.Sc. (Pass) with Mathematics as one of the main subjects with atleast 50% marks in aggregate or any other examination recognized by the M.D. University, Rohtak as equivalent thereto.
 - 4. No one shall be eligible to join I year class of M.Sc. (Computer Sc.) unless:

 He/She has passed Bachelor/Postgraduate Degree in any discipline with atleast 50% marks in aggregate or any other examination recognized by the M.D. University, Rohtak as equivalent thereto.

- 5. No one shall be eligible to join I year class of M.Sc. (Physics) unless:

 He/She has passed B.Sc. (Hons) in Physics/B.Sc. (Pass) with Physics and Mathematics as two of the main subjects with atleast 50% marks in aggregate or any other examination recognized by the M.D. University, Rohtak as equivalent thereto.
- 6. No one shall be eligible to join I year of M.Sc. (Chemistry) unless he/she has passed B.Sc. (Hons.) in Chemistry / B.Sc. (Pass) with Chemistry as main subject with atleast 50% marks in aggregation and other Examination recognized by M.D. University Rohtak as equivalent thereto.

Promotion under semester system

- 1) The candidate will be allowed to appear in the examination if he/she meets the following requirements.
 - a) Bears a good character.
 - b) Has been on the rolls of the department during the semester/year.
 - c) Has attended not less than 65% of lectures delivered in theory as well as practical.
 - d) Has secured minimum 40% marks in the Internal assessment in each subject.
- 2) For the session 2018-19, unless otherwise specified in any Ordinance, the students will be promoted to the next semester/class automatically provided he/she is eligible to appear in the lower semester examination.
- NOTE-1 The duration of the course leading to the degree of Master of Commerce/Master of Science/Master of Arts shall be two academic years i.e. 4 semesters. (i) The maximum period in which a candidate must qualify for the degree shall be five years. If a student passes an examination in the last year of total duration, he/she will not get any regular chance for improvement. (ii) After passing an examination, the student will be allowed two chances for improvement subject to i) above i.e. one chance for odd semesters and second chance for even semesters. The result will be revised after second chance is over. The examination of odd semesters shall be held in the month of November/December and examination of even semesters shall be held in the month of May/June each year.
- **NOTE-2** Minimum pass % for PG classes is 40% in theory, 40% in Internal Assessment separately and 40% in aggregate.
- **NOTE-3** In respect of those candidates who want to seek admission to M.A./M.Sc. and have studied the concerned subject at graduation level, a merit position will be decided by the percentage of marks obtained in B.A./B.Sc. I, II & III plus the percentage of marks in concerned subject taken together.
- **NOTE-4** In respect of those candidates who want to seek admission to M.A./M.Sc. in a subject which they have not studied in B.A./B.Sc., the merit position will be decided by the percentage of marks obtained in B.A./B.Sc. I, II & III.
- NOTE-5 A candidate who is placed under compartment in the qualifying examination shall not be allowed admission to PG classes
- **NOTE-6** The candidates belonging to SC/ST category who secure minimum pass marks in qualifying examination may be considered eligible on the basis of merit for admission in the affiliated colleges.
- **NOTE-7** Failed students will not be readmitted in the college.





A Brief Profile

Aggarwal College Ballabgarh (Estd. 1971), is a post graduate co-educational institution affiliated to M.D. University, Rohtak. It is situated in Ballabgarh, Distt. Faridabad on NH-2, a part of the National Capital Region and is approx. 45 km from Indira Gandhi International Airport, New Delhi. The college is running 7 under graduate, 5 Hons. and 8 post graduate courses. Besides 28 certificate courses, 5 diploma courses, 3 advance diploma courses, six add-on courses, two vocation degree courses sponsored by University Grants Commission, New Delhi are also running to equip students with market oriented innovative skills.

The total students strength is 4768. There are 140 qualified and trained faculty to effectively implement the teaching, learning and evaluation process. The college has 12 Computer labs having 573 PC/nComputing devices with Wi-Fi and Internet facilities and total 691 computer. The central library of the college has OPAC and is a regular subscriber to N-LIST and INFLIBNET. The college has students' Web/Portal and developed state/of/the/art Learning Management System. Beside 59 class rooms, there are 18 smart class rooms for using ICT tools in teaching and learning. The college has three NSS units and two NCC units.

To provide value oriented holistic education, particularly to the rural areas, college has some good practices like Mentoring System, Cultural Activities, Sports Club, Red Ribbon Club, Entrepreneur Club, Equal Opportunity Cell, Online Feedback from stakeholders and a number of fora/societies of different streams. In order to sustain quality education and to set the benchmark in holistic education, the college is being guided by Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) which sets goals for the overall development of the institution. A number of our students have outperformed in Sports & Cultural activities and brought laurels to the college both at National and International Level.

The college has been reaccredited 'A' Grade with CGPA 3.40 by NAAC in 2014.

The college has been granted 'College with potential for Excellence' (CPE) status by UGC, New Delhi.
